- 1. Describe the nutritional values of food, quantity of a balanced diet and how they help recovery.
- 2. Prepare and serve one of the following: egg custard, jelly, milk pudding, fresh juice, flavoured milk drink, etc.
- 3. Set an invalid's tray and show how to feed and give food and drink to a patient who needs help.

VI. Treatment and observation of excrete

1. Record all body waste of the patient including frequency, quantity, type, shape, colour, etc.

VII. Prevent Infections

1. Explain how infections happen and the ways of prevention.

VIII. Wound Dressing

- 1. Demonstrate how to use cold pad, warm pad and dry dressing on any area of hands and feet and secure it with a bandage.

II. To measure Patient's Vital Signs

Demonstrate measuring and recording body temperature, pulse and breathing when the patient is not able to self-help.

III. Personal Hygiene

- 1. How to help a patient with the morning and evening toilet using, including washing in bed, giving a mouth wash and brushing hair.
- 2. Tell which areas of a patient's body are subjected to pressure in bed and the corresponding influence upon the patient, and how soreness of these areas can be prevented.

I. Written Test

The test will be conducted in the form of multiple choice including the following content:

- 1. Basic theory of Life Saving
- 2. Skills of Life Saving
- 3. Skills of Recovery
- 4. First Aid Knowledge
- 5. Aftercare

II. Resuscitation

Perform Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation by using a dummy.

III. Water Test

1. Rescue on land

- i. Use of an appointed rescue instrument.
- ii. Rescue a conscious casualty who is 2 to 10 metres away from the bank.
- iii. Ensure the safety of the casualty and help her to land.

2. Water rescue

- i. Use of an appointed rescue instrument.
- ii. Approach from shallow water.
- iii. Rescue a conscious casualty who is 15 metres away from the bank.
- iv. Tow the casualty to the bank and help her to get out of the water.

3. Non-contact Rescue

- i. Candidate should wear a long-sleeve shirt, trousers or dress.
- ii. Can take off the above clothings before entering water.
- iii. Get in deep water.
- iv. Swim 50 metres to a casualty.
- v. Perform defensive methods.
- vi. Use non-contact rescue without any floating help.
- vii. Rescue a casualty who is 50 metres away from the bank. Tow the casualty to the pool side and use support position to hold the casualty (time allowed 3 minutes and 15 seconds).
- viii. Help the casualty to land from deep water.
- ix. Look after the casualty after landing.



Life Saving

4. Contact Rescue

- i. Get in deep water.
- ii. Swim 50 metres to a casualty.
- iii. Perform Release Method.
- iv. Use Chin Tow or Cross Chest Tow.
- v. Rescue a casualty who is 50 metres away from the bank then use support position to hold the casualty.
- vi. Perform Towing Restraint on the way to the bank.
- vii. Tow the casualty to the bank and help her to land.
- viii. Look after the casualty after landing.

5. Emergency Resuscitation

- i. Get in deep water.
- ii. Swim 15 metres to the search area.
- iii. Use surface dive.
- iv. Dive into 1.5 to 1.8 metres to find a target.
- v. Change to an unconscious casualty and tow to a supporting point, perform ten cycles of supported Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR).
- vi. Help the person to land.
- vii. Perform Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR) and treatment of Vomit.
- viii. Place the person in the Recovery Position.

Bronze

A minimum service of 20 hours within a period of 12 months must be recorded. Services recognized would include those organized by the Guide Company's Sponsoring Authority or The Hong Kong Girl Guides Association.

Silver

A minimum of 40 hours of the Community Service within a period of 12 months must be recorded. The definition of the 40 hours EXCLUDES services in functions organized by the Company's Sponsoring Authority and the 20 hours services required by the Bronze Service Flash.

Gold

A minimum of 40 hours of Community Service within a period of 24 months, including at least a service project (including the meeting, preparation and the direct service should not less than 12 hours and the serving targets should not be the sponsoring body and also excluding those hours recorded in the Bronze and Silver Flash) approved by the Unit Guider must be recorded for this Gold Service Flash.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

A proposal must be submitted before the assessment. After completing the service, please submit the activity records and the evaluation report.
 - Candidates who have completed the Service Section at the Gold Level of the HKAYP in corresponding item are qualified for the Service Flash (Gold).

*For Gold Award activities, you need to submit the proposal at least 1 month before the starting date. After the HKGGAOA review, the proposal will be submitted to the Award Office for Section Panels' approval. The activities can only begin after receiving notification of approval from the Section Panels. Late submissions may not be accepted.



Accident Prevention

Make a logbook to show the following:

 - 2. Electricity devices

 - 5. If you have participated in any activity organized by ICAC, tell the Assessor about it and what you have benefited from the activity.
- III. Collect information of cases in the recent two years related to honesty (with newspaper cuttings or related information) and discuss with the Assessor your view of such cases based on "Materialism" and "Honesty".

- V. Introduce the equipment required for bird-watching, the considerations about the weather and the basic observation skills.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Bird-watching" topic are qualified for this badge.



Child Care

The assessment applies throughout to the care of children aged three to six.

During the assessment you are required to take care of a child of this age group for any part of his / her day. You must have a sense of responsibility and a high standard of personal hygiene.

Make a logbook to show the following:

- I. Explain to the Assessor:
 - 1. How a child should be clothed during different seasons in a year.
 - 2. Plan a one day menu for him / her.
 - 3. What kind of toys is suitable for him / her.
 - 4. Plan a day, showing the importance of a regular routine.
 - 5. How to prevent accidents in the house.
 - 6. How to put a child to bed.
 - 7. Identify the signs and symptoms of illness and abnormal behaviour of a child.
 - 8. How to check body temperature for a child and the suitable care to be given when a child has a fever.
 - 9. How well you understand that when dealing with a child, you must carry out whatever you have said you will do, and must never resort to bribery or threats.
- II. Take charge of a child or small group of children for part of a day under the supervision of the Assessor. This should include:
 - 1. Helping the child to wash before a meal, and serving him / her a meal.
 - 2. Setting out suitable material for play and supervising its use; joining in if the child requires it.
 - 3. Telling a story with illustrations or actions.



Chinese Culture

- Explain the meaning of "The Offspring of the Dragon" and the impact it has on the Chinese.
- II. Research one item on each of the following Chinese Cultural items and give a detailed explanation to the Assessor:
 - 1. Performance Art (dance, Chinese opera, juggling, drama, etc.)
 - 2. Customary and Social Convention (food, costumes, religions, etc.)
 - 3. Technology (architecture, medicine, calendar, etc.)
 - 4. Visual art (drawings, calligraphy, embroidery, pottery, etc.)
- III. Discuss with the Assessor the origin and characteristics of two Chinese rituals. For example, the rituals surrounding the giving of birth, celebration of the first month or the first year of birth, birthdays, festivals and worshipping rituals etc.
- IV. Present a Chinese ritual that your family is practising (endorsed by parents) and its origin.

Remarks

An appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.



Etiquette

Make a log book to show the following:

- I. General Situation
 - 1. Show the dress code for not less than three different situations of your own choice, e.g. visiting a friend, going to a concert, attending a wedding, etc.
 - 2. Tell the Assessor the use of cosmetics and use pictures to illustrate suitable make up for different occasions.
 - 3. Demonstrate good postures in front of the Assessor including sitting, standing, walking and talking etc.
 - 4. Explain with the help of pictures to demonstrate table manners (For one eastern country and one western country).
 - 5. The important things you need to take care of when meeting people of different nationalities for the first time.

II. Situations when you are in uniform

Explain to the Assessor the following:

- 1. The meaning of wearing uniform correctly.
- 2. Explain to the Assessor the standard of the Hong Kong Girl Guides uniform and the suitable manners when wearing uniform.
- 3. Explain to the Assessor at what situation and to whom you need to salute when you are in uniform, including meeting (at least three) other uniform group member.

Remarks



Guide Friendship

- I. Explain fully what the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts is. Find out the links of this World Family.
- II. Introduce Hong Kong and the history of Hong Kong Guiding Movement in an interesting way to an oversea visitor. (The Assessor may impersonate the visitor if necessary.)
- III. Choose one from the following and keep correspondence with her / him for at least one year and show the Assessor copies of letters or e-mail written and received and material exchanged, etc. Know something of the history and traditions of your pen friend's country, and of the Guide Association(s) there, including the uniforms and badges. If your friend is a member of another youth group, get to know the background, uniform and badges of that organization.
 - A Guide from another country.
 - 2. A member from another youth uniform group.

Note: Before exchanging material, customs regulations should be studied.

IV. Do four of the following:

- 1. Dress yourself, or a member from your Patrol, in the uniform or national costume of a Member Country and explain its characteristics.
- 2. Be able to recognize the National Costume of four countries of your own choice. Dress a doll in one of the costumes and explain to the Assessor the history, culture and religion of that Country.
- 3. Greet Guides from three different countries in their own languages.
- 4. Cook a foreign dish and bring it to the assessment (with the recipe and cooking method).
- 5. Demonstrate a handcraft typical of another Country.
- 6. Sing a traditional song of another country. (Print the lyrics and bring your own accompanist if necessary.)
- 7. Tell a legend or folk tale of another country. (Bring a printed version.)
- 8. Perform on your own or take part in a National Dance of another Country, and briefly introduce it to the Assessor. (Bring your music, costume, etc. if necessary.)
- 9. With your Patrol, play a game from another country. (Certified by your Guider.)
- 10. In your Unit meeting entertain a Guide member from another Country. (Certified by your Guider.)



Hong Kong History

- I. Explain briefly the origin of the name "Hong Kong".
- II. Visit and keep a record of a building or area of interest in Hong Kong and share with the Assessor.
- III. Use a logbook to show the story of the area where you live or tell a story of a vicinity in the past, or describe that area at one period in the past.
- IV. Choose one of the following and discover something about it and share with the Assessor:
 - 1. A local legend, custom or craft; or
 - 2. Discover the old names and origin of these names of six local places.
- V. Tell the story of three people who have played an interesting role in the history of Hong Kong and their contribution to the place.

Remarks

An appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.



Hosting

- I. Prepare refreshment for a Girl Guide function and entertain the Assessor or someone chosen by him / her at the event.
- II. Discuss the following with the Assessor:
 - 1. Things you have to pay attention to when someone pays a visit to you.
 - 2. The Chinese and the Western table manners and the arrangements of seats for visitors.
- III. Explain to the Assessor what preparations and arrangements are required on the following areas when organizing activities for teenagers or the elderly:
 - 1. A plan for the party
 - 2. Activities for the party
 - 3. The menu
 - 4. An invitation letter / card
- IV. Take to the assessment:
 - 1. A thank-you letter with a correctly addressed envelope.
 - 2. An attractively wrapped gift.

Remarks

An appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Hosting" topic are qualified for this badge.



Knowledge of China


- I. Briefly introduce the establishment of PRC.
- II. Explain the symbolization of the National Badge, the National Flag and the National Song of China and their meanings to the people.
- III. Demonstrate to the Assessor that you understand the proper manner in the National Flag hoisting and the playing of the National Song and sing the National Song to the Assessor.
- IV. Show the geographic location of China on a map and identify the locations of Provinces, Special Municipalities, Autonomous Regions and Special Administrative Regions.
- V. List the names of all the existing nationalities (ethnic minority groups) in China and introduce two of them to the Assessor in an interesting way.
- VI. List the official organizations of the PRC and the present Chairman and Chief Executive.
- VII. List at least seven functions of the National People's Congress.
- VIII. Undergo a study of a topic (e.g. Economy, people's livelihood etc.) related to PRC with not more than four other Girl Guides.

Remarks



Pet Care

- I. For at least 6 months, look after your pet and keep a record showing how you done so.
- II. Explain the following:
 - 1. A general knowledge of your pet's health.
 - 2. How to deal with its breeding.
 - 3. How to avoid abuse of a pet such as over feeding, lack of discipline in training, unsuitable living conditions (such as kennels, cages, etc.) and insufficient care in grooming, etc.
 - 4. What kind of disease your pet could get and how it could affect you.
 - 5. How to take care of your sick pet and how to obtain appropriate help.
 - 6. How to take care of an elderly pet.
 - 7. How to deal with death.
- III. Explain what you do when you are going on a trip.
- IV. Introduce some organizations that provide pet care advice such as the AFCD, SPCA etc.
- V. Explain why it is sometimes necessary to have an animal put to sleep.
- VI. Share some of your happy and unhappy experiences about keeping pet(s).



Reading

Make a log book to show the following:

- I. Complete one of the following:
 - 1. Be a library helper of not less than three months in your school or public library and keep a record of your service.
 - 2. Briefly introduce the types of public libraries, their services, and promotion activities. Introduce to the Assessor the location, ways to get there, facilities and services of a public library near your home or school.
- II. Introduce the category methods that are commonly used in a library.
- III. Within a period of three months, choose two books from the following categories, read and write a book report.
 - 1. Philosophy
 - 2. Religion
 - 3. Sociology
 - 4. Language
 - 5. Natural Science
 - 6. Applied Science
 - 7. Art
 - 8. Literature
 - 9. History
 - 10. Story or fiction
- IV. Submit your reading record of not less than three months, including basic information such as the author, publisher, etc.
- V. Introduce to the Assessor the content of three of the books in your reading record (including at least one fiction and one non-fiction).

Note

The assessment can be done in English or Chinese.

Remarks

An appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.



Secretary

- I. Keep a Patrol log book and minutes for two consecutive months or a detailed logbook of a Guide camp or holiday camp.
- II. At the assessment, fill in a form assigned by the Assessor, and demonstrate how to write a cheque.
- III. At the assessment, be prepared to write any three of the following:
 - 1. A letter inviting neighbouring Guide Units to join a function of your Company, stating time, place, form of entertainment, number of Guides, etc.
 - 2. A reply letter to such an invitation.
 - 3. A letter explaining your absence from a Guide meeting.
 - 4. A letter of thanks for a donation of food, a gift, or as a Guest of Honour.
 - 5. An application for a job.
 - 6. A notice of an activity.
 - 7. A letter to apply for the use of a venue.
- IV. Write a descriptive report of 200-300 words suitable for a magazine or newspaper, of one Guide event you have attended.

Note

The assessment can be done in English or Chinese.

Remarks

An appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.



Translating

Guides must inform the Assessor what language will be used at initial contact. See notes below.

I. Read, write and talk with the Assessor in a language other than your own.

For Clauses II and III, the visitor can be impersonated by the Assessor if necessary.

- II. Answer questions that would probably be asked by a foreign visitor.
- III. 1. Help a person from abroad on a shopping expedition, interpret his / her needs and be able to state the exchange rate of the two currencies.
 - 2. Introduce to a visitor from abroad the sight-seeing spots in Hong Kong.
- IV. 1. Help someone from abroad to plan a journey in Hong Kong and tell where to obtain the necessary information.
 - 2. Help someone with the language you choose in Clause I to do the following:
 - a. to see a doctor
 - b. to complete a form
 - c. to obtain information at the police or railway station, or a bank

Note

For Chinese speaking candidates, Putonghua and all Chinese dialects cannot be used for this badge.



Travelling

Choose a Country to visit

- I. Describe how to apply for passport and visa.
- II. Describe the regulation of vaccinations.
- III. Find the following information of the country you have chosen from books or web site.
 - 1. Climate
 - 2. Transportation
 - 3. Food
 - 4. Currency
 - 5. National Flag
 - 6. Girl Guide uniform (if any) and clothes suitable for the country
- IV. Explain how to get help if accident or emergency should be happened in that country.
- V. Share one of your outbound tour experiences with the Assessor.
- VI. Plan an outbound trip of at least three days and two nights.

Remarks

An appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.



WAGGGS Knowledge

- I. Explain the following:
 - The highlights of the history and structure of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS), including the part played by World Conferences.
 - 2. The meaning of the World Flag and the World Badge.
- II. Find out the wordings of the Guide Promise and Law in eight Member Organizations of WAGGGS (including one from each of the five Regions). Discuss with the Assessor the ways in which these differ from or are similar to the original one and the reason.
- III. Choose one Member Organization of WAGGGS from each of the five Regions. Describe the history and meanings of their national flags and the Guide badge(s) and uniform(s) of each. Illustrate information about the present-day life of girls in each of the chosen countries. (You can look at their clothings, food, ways of living, what they do and their religions.)
- IV. List the name and location of all the World Centres and introduce one of them in an interesting way.
- V. Do four from the following:
 - 1. Explain the significance of World Thinking Day and devise a ceremony for your Patrol or Company, run it and keep a record. Tell how the World Thinking Day Fund is used.
 - 2. Correspond with a Guide from another country and show the Assessor copies of letters written and received. Describe the history and traditions of your penfriend's country and the Guide Association(s) there. (Different from those in Clause III.)
 - 3. Find out the current theme of WAGGGS which help people in need throughout the world. With your Patrol choose a current project, plan and carry out a fund-raising event for it. Tell the Assessor what you have done and show the posters, notices, receipts, etc. relating to your chosen project.
 - 4. Entertain a Guide from another Country at a Patrol or Company meeting.
 - 5. Dress yourself, or a member from your Patrol, in the uniform or national costume of a Member Organization and explain its characteristics.
 - 6. Learn and teach a song or dance from a Member Organization and tell its source or history.



WAGGGS Knowledge

- 7. Find out what the Guide Introduction Card is, and how to activate it.
- 8. Find out some facts about the historical, cultural and religious background of a Member Organization. Present these in an interesting way to the Assessor.
- 9. Plan a Tour to the country of a Member Organization. Describe the climate, currencies, food, etc.



Writing

- I. Explain to the assessor three different types of writings (e.g. Persuasion, Exposition, Narration, Poem, etc.)
- II. Bring one written item from from the following:
 - a) A story of not less than 500 words.
 - b) A one-act play of at least 10 minutes.
 - c) An article of not less than 500 words about a Girl Guide activity.
- III. Create one from the following:
 - a) A short poem.
 - b) A camp fire yarn of about 200 words.
 - c) An article explaining your own opinion or agreement on a particular topic.
- IV. At the assessment write an article assigned by the Assessor (not less than 300 words).

Remarks

An appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Writing" topic are qualified for this badge.



Art

- Bring to the assessment at least two pieces of your artwork, in more than one medium, showing different subjects, e.g. landscapes, portraits, figures, still-life, abstract, flowers. Dimensions of the artwork should be not less than 30cm by 43cm (A3) size.
- II. Bring to the assessment two of your own designs of the following:
 - 1. A poster
 - 2. A notice for a Guide event
 - 3. A greetings card
 - 4. A drawing or sketch of a Guiding activity
 - 5. A printing (e.g. lino-cut printing or a potato-print)
 - 6. A detailed drawing in pencil, brush, pen or charcoal of different parts of plants or flowers
- III. At the assessment, draw a picture of size not less than A3 on a topic chosen by the Assessor / Guider. The medium to be chosen and provided by the candidate.
- IV. Tell the Assessor / Guider of your performance and contribution in any occasion of Guiding activity during the last twelve months using your artistic talent.

An appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.



Ballroom Dance

- I. Choose three Ballroom dances and wear suitable dancewear to perform.
- II. Introduce two kinds of Ballroom dance to the Assessor (such as Waltz, Tango).
- III. Improvise some form of accompaniments chosen by the Assessor.
- IV. When you start to work for the badge, with your coach or teacher, set yourself targets for improvement over at least the next 6 weeks.

Note

- 1. Candidates should bring their own music.
- 2. Holders of Grade 3 of Dance Tests (Ballroom Branch) in the NATD are qualified for this badge.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Holders of this badge are qualified for the Physical Recreation Section at the Silver Level of the HKAYP.



Carpentry (Stage I)

- I. Make a collection of some illustrations of models of some small wooden articles in a logbook.
- II. Describe or demonstrate:
 - 1. How to measure accurately.
 - 2. How to use nails and screws.
 - 3. How to use glue and adhesives.
 - 4. How to use simple tenon.
 - 5. How to smooth a rough surface with sandpaper.
 - 6. Different methods of colouring.
 - 7. How to use common tools such as hammer, saw, screw driver, right-angle, plane, chisel, etc.
- III. Show and introduce three types of common wood.
- IV. Make a simple wooden article and list the materials, accessories and procedures in detail.
- V. Demonstrate the proper way to drive in nails.

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Bronze Level of the HKAYP in the "Carpentry (Stage I)" topic are qualified for this badge.



Carpentry (Stage II)

Must be a holder of Carpentry Badge (Stage I)

- I. Make a useful object, which includes at least one of the following items: tenon, hinges or locks.
- II. Make a list of different types of paints used by carpenters and explain their usages.
- III. Introduce at least four types of nails, screw drivers and four types of saws and explain their usages.
- IV. Demonstrate or illustrate how to install cork board.

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Silver Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Carpentry (Stage II)" topic are qualified for this badge.



Computer

- I. Make a logbook to introduce the following:
 - 1. The difference of hardware and software in the computer system.
 - 2. The functions of at least ten computer hard wares such as input / output devices and main / supplementary storage, etc.
- II. Explain to the Assessor the relationship between file and folder and demonstrate how to create and delete a folder.
- III. Explain how to open a word-processing software. Type a paragraph (Chinese / English) and save it at a designated path according to the instruction of the Assessor. (Speed of typing should be at least 20 wpm for English and 10 wpm for Chinese.)
- IV. Able to connect to the internet using wireless and broadband and know how data are transmitted on the internet.
- V. Know how to install and use different kinds of screening software to block the website that is not suitable for children and teenagers.



Cooking

- I. Bring to the assessment a letter from your mother or home economics teacher to certify that you have prepared, cooked, and served a completed dinner for two to four persons and cleared things away afterwards. (Supported with photos.)
- II. At the assessment, cook a meal for two to four according to the menu in your logbook, choose one of the following:
 - 1. Chinese style: with two courses, a soup and rice.
 - 2. Western style: appetizer, main dish, dessert or drink.
 - 3. Other styles: with two courses, a soup and main dish.
- III. 1. Make and serve a hot tea or coffee.
 - 2. Make and serve a drink e.g. Ovaltine, Horlicks or lemon tea, etc.
- IV. Lay a table for two persons for a midday meal.
- V. Wash up utensils, boards, etc. that have been used at the assessment.
- VI. Explain to the Assessor:
 - 1. The important points to note when using fresh, frozen and canned foods for cooking.
 - 2. How to plan a well-balanced menu for a family of four for one day.
- VII. Explain what safety precautions should be taken to prevent accidents in a kitchen and the ways to tackle with them.

Remarks

An appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Cooking" topic are qualified for this badge.



Craft

- I. Do four of the following and explain briefly to the Assessor the material, tools used and the way of making it.
 - 1. Embroider an original design.
 - 2. Fabric printing. You may use a lino-block, potato-cut, screen, or tie-dying.
 - 3. Make a puppet.
 - 4. Make a carving in a medium soft enough to cut easily, e.g. plaster, clay, wood, wax, soap, etc.
 - 5. Make a clay item.
 - 6. Make a basket or knit an article for decoration.
 - 7. Make an article in leather.
 - 8. Make a carpet or a decorative floor covering, e.g. rags, linen, strings, etc.
 - 9. Make an item with mosaic pattern.
 - 10. Make any kind of craft article. (Discuss with the Assessor in advance.)
- II. Bring to the assessment one unfinished article on which you can demonstrate your ability to the Assessor.

Remarks

An appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.



Dance

- I. Learn a folk dance from three different countries. Perform at least one of these at the assessment.
 - 2. Tell the Assessor something about the costumes worn by dancers and the historical background of the dance.
- II. Using any dance from you choice:
 - 1. Perform a dance lasting approximately 3 minutes and demonstrate at least 4 basic steps.
 - 2. Perform a dance in the assessment with music or some other form of accompaniment chosen by the Assessor. If you chose a Folk Dance or Social Dance, you may bring a friend with you to help.

Note

- 1. Your Unit Guider must tell the Assessor before the assessment which dance forms you have chosen.
- 2. Holders of Level IV or above, Elementary Level in Folk Dance of Royal Academy of Dance, or Grade 6 or above in Chinese Dance of Beijing Dance College are qualified for this badge.

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the Physical Recreation Section at the Bronze Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Physical Recreation Section at the Bronze Level of the HKAYP in the "Dance" topic are qualified for this badge.

 - 3. Left-TURN
 - 4. Right-TURN
 - 5. About-TURN
 - 6. MARK-TIME
 - 7. Quick/Forward-MARCH
 - 8. HALT
 - 9. Fall-IN
 - 10. Fall-OUT
 - 11. Dis-MISS
 - 12. The Guide Sign and Salute
 - 13. Award Presentation
- IV. 1. As a Patrol Leader participate in the following:
 - a. Roll Call Drill
 - b. Horseshoe Formation
 - 2. Explain to the Assessor the above ceremonies.

- I. Explain the use and maintenance of different types of tools and instruments used in flower arranging.
- II. Discuss with the Assessor:
 - 1. Preparation of flowers and leaves for a flower arrangement.
 - 2. Two methods of drying flowers.
 - 3. Various methods of fixing flowers in a container.
 - 4. How to extend the life of the arranged flowers and leaves.
- III. At the assessment demonstrate any two of the following:
 - 1. An arrangement of dried flowers or artificial flowers.
 - 2. Do one arrangement from the 12 basic forms.
 - 3. A round arrangement for the centre of a dining table.
 - 4. A mini arrangement under 10 cm in height.

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Flower Arranging" topic are qualified for this badge.



Gardening

- I. Transplant three seedlings to a pot, and take care of those plants for about one month. Observe and record the growing of the plants. The Assessor will assess the process and the product.
- II. Make a logbook to show the following:
 - 1. A record of the caring of the plants in Clause I and their growing process.
 - 2. Collect and make spacemen of five kinds of shrubs and introduce the characteristics of plants.
 - 3. List the time for reproduction of at least one kind of plants and introduce at least two ways of reproduction of plants.
 - 4. Write your reflection on caring of plants.
- III. Introduce the usage and maintenance of gardening equipment.

Remarks

The assessment should be spread over a period of three months during which frequent reports are to be submitted to the Unit Guider. The report should be certified by your Guider.

- Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Gardening" topic are qualified for this badge.

Homemaking

- I. Perform housework for seven consecutive days or four weekends (consecutive if possible). Take a note to the assessment with your parent's signature to certify that you have done the following satisfactorily.
 - 1. Lay the dining table and clear it and wash up after one main meal.
 - 2. Make your bed and keep your bedroom tidy.
 - 3. Undertake the weekly cleaning and vacuuming of your room.
 - 4. Cook a simple meal for the family including a soup and two courses.
 - 5. Clean the toilet.
 - 6. Change the bed sheets at least once within the above seven days or four weekends.
- II. Discuss with the Assessor:
 - 1. How fresh, frozen, canned and dried food should be stored.
 - 2. Plan the menu for a day for your family, showing that you have basic knowledge of food values.
 - 3. Prepare a shopping list and the cost for this plan.
 - 4. The precautions to prevent accidents at home.
 - 5. The proper disposal of kitchen waste and how to carry out categorizing of domestic rubbish.
 - 6. The selection of suitable cleaning agents and the correct ways of using them.
- III. Bring to the assessment one of the following or a record with photos or videos:
 - 1. A household item made by yourself.
 - 2. A bed sheet or table cloth you have made or repaired.

- I. Make a logbook to show the following:

 - 3. Intellectual Property Right
 - 4. Computer viruses
 - 5. Information searching
- II. Explain how the development of the Internet affects activities in the community and list the advantages and disadvantages of internet information.
- III. Demonstrate to the Assessor the making of animation.
- IV. Create a website of not less than ten pages by using a website making software.
- V. Design a poster or leaflet for a Girl Guide activity by using the functions (font type, font colour, drag and drop, alignment, indent, spell check, insert clip art and adjusting paper direction, etc.) of a word-processing software.

Language

Learning Goal: Try to talk to others and express herself in the language not of their mother tongue.

It is essential to tell the Assessor the language to be used so as to assure the arrangement of a suitable Assessor. (The language chosen should be the mother tongue or the language of common use of the Assessor). The language to be used cannot be the mother tongue of the candidate.

- I. Introduce yourself to the Assessor.
- II. Read aloud with expression a passage of your own choice. (The passage should be submitted to the Assessor before the assessment.)
- III. According to pictures given by the Assessor, tell a story.
- IV. Talk with the Assessor on the phone.

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.

Laundress

- I. Be ready at the assessment to launder, by hand or in a washing machine, and then to iron, any of the followings:
 - 1. Articles made from cotton or linen
 - 2. A garment made from wool
 - 3. A garment made from a man-made fibre
- II. Explain the International Textile Care Labeling Code.
- III. Be prepared to discuss with the Assessor the suitable ways of removal of four different kinds of stains. (e.g. Egg stain, blood stain, ball pen mark, oil stain, soya sauce, etc.)
- IV. Explain the care and maintenance of the laundry equipment that you use at home.

Map Reading

At the assessment, bring a Hong Kong Map HM20C/WGS84 1:20,000 and a Silva compass. Discuss with the Assessor how to choose and use a map.

In the assessment show the following according to the Assessor's requirement:

- I. Understand the information in a map of HM20C/WGS84. Be able to answer the Assessors' questions.
 - 2. Know the types of maps and their maintenance and demonstrate how to fold a map of HM20C/WGS84.
 - 3. Set a map:
 - i. With a compass.
 - ii. Without a compass, e.g. by sun, stars or landmarks.
 - 4. On a map measure the distance between two places.
 - 5. On a given place, find out its location using grid reference (4 figures and 6 figures) and tell its covering area.
 - 6. From a map of HM20C/WGS84, describe a route of about 6 km chosen by the Assessor.
 - 7. Recognize different geographical features, such as spur, valley, pass, cliff, river and so on by reading contours.
- II. 1. Illustrate the basic structure of a Silva compass by a diagram and explain the maintenance of such a compass.
 - 2. Use the Silva compass to find the Forward Bearing and Backward Bearing of two points.
 - 3. Demonstrate how to use a compass with a map for navigation.

An appointed Guider who holds a valid HKAYP Expedition Instructor Certificate may take this badge assessment for her own Unit.

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the theoretical part of map reading training in the Adventurous Journey Section at the Bronze Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Adventurous Journey Section at the Silver Level or above of the HKAYP are qualified for this badge.



Musical Ability (Stage I)

Can be done by using a Chinese or Western instrument

- I. Perform two pieces with contrasting styles: one by a modern composer, one by an ancient period composer.
- II. Play three campfire songs as accompaniment (sung by yourself or others) with different chords and accompaniment styles.
- III. Read a simple score assigned by the Assessor.
- IV. At the assessment, play any scale or arpeggio (major or minor, up to four sharps or flats) for two octaves chosen by the Assessor.

Holders of Grade/Level 4 or above (instruments other than piano) of the Associated Board of Royal Schools of Music or the Central Conservatory of Music are qualified for this Badge.

Musical Ability (Stage II)

Must be a holder of Musician Badge (Stage I)

Can be done by using a Chinese or Western instrument

- I. Perform two pieces from different musical periods and tell the Assessor the musical features of the two periods. These musical features should include 4 of the following: Texture, Rhythm, Tempo, Tonality, Dynamics and Form.
- II. Tell the Assessor 3 composers respectively from each of the two periods.
- III. Compose a piece of not less than 6 bars. The piece must be of compound time. State the tempo and dynamics clearly.
- IV. Play a piece you like (Grade 5 or above and different from clause I) and explain why you like it.

Holders of Grade/Level 8 or above (instruments other than piano) of the Associated Board of Royal Schools of Music or the Central Conservatory of Music, and related performance experiences (with certified copy) are qualified for this Badge.

If using the Musical Ability (Stage II) as the corresponding item for the Skills Section at the Gold Level* of the HKAYP, please discuss with the HKGGAOA before initiating the activity. A proposal must be submitted before the assessment. After completing the activity, please submit the activity records and the evaluation report.

*For Gold Award activities, you need to submit the proposal at least 1 month before the starting date. After the HKGGAOA review, the proposal will be submitted to the Award Office for Section Panels' approval. The activities can only begin after receiving notification of approval from the Section Panels. Late submissions may not be accepted.



Needlework

- Using more than five kinds of stitch, make and decorate a garment, e.g. apron, tablecloth or house accessories.
 - 1. At the assessment, demonstrate three of the above stitches and explain their uses.
- II. Illustrate and demonstrate the following:
 - 1. The correct use of a paper pattern, including placing on fabric and cutting out.
 - 2. The use of a sewing machine.
 - 3. Two methods of making seams and neatening of raw edges.
 - 4. Dispose of fullness.

 - 7. Make a worked, bound or machined buttonhole.
- III. Submit one garment, using fabric of your own choice. List out the material used, cost and the process of making it.

- I. Tell the Assessor the names and the functions of the parts of a camera, e.g. lens, shutter and stops etc.
- II. Explain briefly one of the following:
 - 1. What causes the production of a negative and a positive (print).
 - 2. The forming of pictures in a digital camera.
- III. Explain the Pix of a digital camera.
- IV. Bring to the assessment at least 10 photographs which you have taken and mounted. (The photos can be taken with a mechanical camera or a digital camera.) Describe the condition in which the photographs were taken and points to note in taking such photos. The subjects include at least five of the following:
 - 1. Indoor
 - 2. Portrait
 - 3. Landscape
 - 4. Architecture
 - 5. Action
 - 6. Copy of photograph, drawing, or a painting.
 - 7. Flowers
 - 8. Birds, animals, insects

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Photography" topic are qualified for this badge.



Piano (Stage I)

- I. Perform two pieces from either two of the following musical periods: Baroque,
 Classical, Romantic or 20th Century.
- II. Sing a phrase and indicate the time signature of the song played by the Assessor.
- III. Play any three two-octaves scales and arpeggios including major and minor named by the Assessor.

Holders of Grade 4 or above (Piano) in the Associated Board of Royal Schools of Music; or Grade 5 or above (Piano) in Trinity College London are qualified for this badge.

Piano (Stage II)

Must be a holder of Piano Badge (Stage I)

- I. Perform three pieces from two different musical periods and state the composer and the period respectively.
- II. State the features of a piece played by the Assessor. Discuss four from of the following musical features: Texture, Rhythm, Tempo, Dynamics, Form and Tonality.
- III. Play a piece of your choice (Grade 5 or above and different from Clause I) and explain the reasons why you like.
- IV. Compost and play a melody of not less than 8 bars and state the tempo and dynamics clearly.
- V. Must have at least one public performance or competition experience (Certified by the related organization).

Note

Holders of Grade 7 or above (Piano) in the Associated Board of Royal Schools of Music; or Grade 8 or above (Piano) in the Trinity College London and related performance experiences (with certified copy) are qualified for this Badge.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

If using the Piano (Stage II) as the corresponding item for the Skills Section at the Gold Level* of the HKAYP, please discuss with the HKGGAOA before initiating the activity. A proposal must be submitted before the assessment. After completing the activity, please submit the activity records and the evaluation report.

*For Gold Award activities, you need to submit the proposal at least 1 month before the starting date. After the HKGGAOA review, the proposal will be submitted to the Award Office for Section Panels' approval. The activities can only begin after receiving notification of approval from the Section Panels. Late submissions may not be accepted.



Private Collection

Bring your collection to the assessment. If the items are of large quantity or large size, you can discuss with the Assessor before the assessment for special arrangement.

- I. Over a period of at least six months, make a collection of stamps, postmarks, crests, fossils, dolls, or coins, etc.
- II. Arrange your collection in the best way possible, e.g. putting stamps in a stamp album. Explain your system to the Assessor.
- III. Label and identify the items in your collection in an interesting way.
- IV. Tell the Assessor how you can learn more about your collection.
- V. Arrange for your Patrol or Company to look at your collection and be able to talk about it and answer questions. If the Assessor is not your Guider, discuss with the Assessor to make special arrangement or produce a certification from your Guider for this Clause.

An appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Private Collection" topic are qualified for this badge.



Public Speaking

- I. Explain to the Assessor what you have to pay attention to when giving a speech.
- II. Recite from memory a short poem, passage or verse of your own choice (1 to 2 minutes).
- III. Read aloud with expression a passage or prayer provided by the Assessor.
- IV. Deliver a speech not less than 3 minutes on a subject given by the Assessor to you 5 minutes beforehand.

Note

- 1. The assessment can be done in English, Cantonese or Putonghua.
- 2. Candidates with the certificate awarded by the Hong Kong Schools Music and Speech Festival in the past two years can be exempted from Clause II.

Pass the following 3 clauses:

- II. Complete the following by using Morse code: (Different means are acceptable, e.g. Light, sound, flag, etc.)
 - 1. Read 5 messages in Morse code given by the Assessor.
 - 2. Send and receive short messages out of talking range. (The sending and receiving procedures must be correct.)
- III. Radio communication
 - 1. Demonstrate the correct voice procedure.
 - 2. Explain the radio discipline.
 - 3. Explain the terms used in communication. (e.g. Hello, Over, Out, Roger, etc.)
 - 4. Demonstrate how to pronounce the 26 letters in Standard Phonetic Alphabet.
 - 5. Explain the important items to consider when using wireless communication in Hong Kong, and the license scheme and how to apply for a license.
 - 6. Demonstrate how to use a simple walkie-talkie.

You should aim at style, rhythm, accuracy, and the ability to get a message through, rather than speed.

Singing

- I. Sing an octave of a major scale upward.
- II. Sing two songs of your own choice from memory. One should be of English or foreign folk-song (not from your usual campfire repertoire) and the other a song to which an accompaniment is essential. The accompanist must be brought to the assessment.
- III. Sing two campfire songs with action.
- IV. Tap a rhythm played by the Assessor.
- V. Sight reading and sing a song assigned by the Assessor in the assessment.

Holders of Grade 4 or above in the Associated Board of Royal Schools of Music (Singing) are qualified for this badge.

- II. Explain to the Assessor the labels that are commonly seen on toys.
- III. Explain how to choose toys for children of different age group and points to note.

Basic Survival

- I. Complete the following to show that you are able to cope with living in the wild:
 - 1. Explain to the Assessor points to pay attention to when lighting an open fire.
 - 2. Demonstrate how to cook with an open fire using raw materials for a simple meal of two courses (One with cooking utensils one without).
 - 3. Demonstrate to the Assessor how you use a pocket knife that you bring to the assessment.
 - 4. Make a simple one-man shelter from a groundsheet or natural materials (but do protect the natural environment).
 - 5. Explain to the Assessor how you deal with an emergency case. (The case to be provided by the Assessor).
 - 6. Demonstrate how to pack and carry your back pack with your camping gears.
- II. List and explain the Country Code.
- III. Stay alone in the wild for half hour and report on what you have noticed of the birds, animals, plants, insect lives, etc., around you. You may do this clause beforehand in a suitable locality, and bring a certificate to the assessment.

Note

- 1. Firewood and Charcoal can be used for fire lighting.
- 2. Cooking equipment includes cook set and mess tin.



Camping

Make a logbook to show the following:

- I. Share your experience in Camp for at least twice and spend two nights and three days under canvas in one occasion, and participate in camp Patrol duties.
- II. Explain the following:
 - 1. The basic safety in camp and the precaution in bad weather such as wind, rain, thunder, lightning etc.
 - 2. How to take care of the tent, met, bed roll in different kinds of weather and the ways of emergency repair of a tent.
 - 3. How to use cooking stove and to use different kinds of fluid such as wood, charcoal, gas, kerosene, alcohol, wax, etc.
 - 4. How to choose a site for camp and the direction of the tent.
 - 5. How to keep all the equipment in camp such as tents, fluid, activity materials, back up materials etc.
 - 6. Ways of carrying and storing of food.
 - 7. Ways of disposal of waste.
 - 8. The importance of hygiene and safety in camp.
- III. Demonstrate the following:
 - 1. How to pitch, demolish, air and pack up an A-tent, doom tent, store tent and toilet tent.
 - 2. Use the following lashing to make one or more gadgets:
 - i) Square lashing
 - ii) Tripod lashing
 - iii) Snack lashing
 - 3. Use firewood to cook a meal out-of-doors showing at least three methods of cooking, e.g. frying, stewing and boiling.

Camping

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the theoretical part of campcraft and youth hostel knowledge in the Adventurous Journey Section at the Bronze Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Adventurous Journey Section at the Silver Level or above of the HKAYP can be exempted from the Syllabus for items II, the cooking part of the item III and the one-night-and-two-day camp.



Country Walking

- I. Go on at least three hikes in different areas with your friends or Patrol. These hikes should be for purposes, such as bird-watching, plant-observing etc. On each of these hikes, you must go with at least three other people and cover at least 4 km on foot.
- II. In a logbook, record your journeys, including the full particulars of route charts, journey records, purposes of the journeys and any interesting events on the way.
- III. List the Country Code.
- IV. Make a list of the suitable clothings, footwears and equipment for hiking in a variety of weather conditions.
- V. Describe Safety Rules and the procedures for calling for help.
- VI. Describe how to help protect the environment when hiking, e.g. the concept of "Leave No Trace".
- VII. Prepare a First Aid kit suitable for your Patrol on a day trip.

An appointed Guider who holds a valid HKAYP Expedition Instructor Certificate may take this badge assessment for her own Unit.

Candidates who have completed the Adventurous Journey Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Hiking" are qualified for this badge.



Cycling

- I. Explain to the Assessor how to check the functions of a bicycle and the maintenance of a bicycle.
- II. Read a road map. At the assessment, cycle for approximately 2 km along a route indicated on the map by the Assessor.
- III. Demonstrate how to mount and dismount on the kerb side.
- IV. Demonstrate how to replace a loose chain.
- V. Explain the Highway Code as it applies to cycling.
- VI. Explain the proper equipment required on a bicycle and the cyclist for cycling at night.

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the Physical Recreation Section at the Bronze Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Physical Recreation Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Cycling" topic are qualified for this badge.



Food and Nutrition

- I. Tell the Assessor how the four basic food types in the Food Pyramid function in our bodies and the quantity of each type we need each day.
- II. Design a day's menu according to the correct proportions of food in the Pyramid. Evaluate your diet habit and explain how you can improve your own diet.
- III. Choose three types of food from each level of the pyramid and list how many calories are provided by 100g of each of them.
- IV. Write down how many calories are needed daily by different age groups of males and females.
- V.Make a list of different kinds of food for different festivals and on special occasions and tell what level they fit into the Pyramid. Give suggestion on how to modify them to make people healthier.
- VI. Understand the causes of food poisoning and its prevention.
- VII. Explain aerobic exercises and non-aerobic exercises. Introduce two kinds of exercises of each type and list how many calories they consume in an hour and explain the proper ways of eating to regain energy after exercise.

Forestry

- Visit a botanical garden / country park / park. Mark on a sketch-map the
 places where 15 different species of trees grow; identify their twigs, flowers,
 fruits, and leaves.
 - Make leaf prints or bark rubbings of three of them. Illustrate your knowledge on the care and the growth of trees in a logbook or in an album and introduce them to the Assessor.
- II. Describe two ways of developing young seedlings and one experience in a tree planting activity.
- III. 1. Sharpen a knife or change the blade of a saw.
 - 2. Demonstrate the use an axe or saw and know the maintenance of it.
 - 3. List ten wooden items which are used in the daily life.
- IV. Describe functions of trees and ways of their protection.
- V. Introduce the Registration of Old and Valuable Trees in Hong Kong and at least three kinds of endangered trees.
- VI. Illustrate how to prevent forest or hill fires.

Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.



Health

- I. Show by your personal appearance to the Assessor during the assessment that you are genuinely in good health and have good health habits; answer questions on cleanliness of clothing and toiletry articles, the use and the abuse use of cosmetics and deodorants.
- II. Explain the dangers of ill-fitting and unsuitable footwears. Describe how to choose a suitable pair of shoes for yourself.
- III. Describe the ways in which you try to keep your teeth and gums healthy.
- IV. Discuss with the Assessor how health is affected by cleanliness, posture of sitting and standing, exercising, sleeping, food, junk food, unwise dieting, drugs, smoking and alcohol.
- V. Discuss with the Assessor how you spend your leisure time to show that you are trying to maintain a balance in your various activities, interests, and work.

Remarks

An Appointed Guider may assess this badge for her own Unit.



Hiking

Make a logbook to show the following:

- I. Go on two overnight hikes with your Unit or Patrol. Decide a purpose for each hike (e.g. bird-watching, plant-observing). You must cover at least 20 km on foot in each hike.
- II. Use a map of HM20C/WGS84 1:20000 and a Silva compass for navigation.
- III. List the group equipment and personal equipment for an overnight hike.
- IV. Pack a backpack for an overnight hike and show the way of water proofing.
- V. Plan your journey, including the route, alternative route, rescue point, food and emergency food. Know how to seek help and what to do when get lost, or when there is a hill fire or bad weather.
- VI. Food and cooking: introduce some food that is suitable for hiking and its advantages. Describe what attention should be paid when cooking during the journey and what safety measures need to be taken.
- VII. Plan the meals of an overnight hike including the quantity, methods of carrying and cooking.
- VIII. Explain the treatment of graze, twist, cramp and heat stroke and the ways of call for help in different situations.

Remarks

An appointed Guider who holds a valid HKAYP Expedition Instructor Certificate may take this badge assessment for her own Unit.

- Holders of this badge are qualified for corresponding theoretical part in the Adventurous Journey Section at the Bronze Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Adventurous Journey Section at the Silver Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Hiking" are qualified for this badge.



Nature

Make a logbook to show the following:

- I. Study a chosen area for six months. Make notes on animal life noticed during this time. Your record should include at least five kinds of animals. (Including birds, mammals, reptile, etc.)
 - 1. Date of observation
 - 2. Locations
 - 3. Name of the animals (including Chinese, English and Latin)
 - 4. Pictures of the animals
 - 5. Distribution
 - 6. Food
 - 7. Life style
 - 8. Living in the wild
- II. Explain the characteristics of vertebrate and invertebrate animals and how they affect the natural environment.
- III. Introduce some organizations that work on the protection of wild animals such as The Conservancy Association, AFCD, etc.
- IV. Record with the help of photos and words the lives and characteristics of at least five kinds of Hong Kong plants. Describe their trunks, branches, leaves, flowers and fruits (at least three of them should be trees).
- V. Collect specimens of at least five types of plants.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Holders of this badge are qualified for the Skills Section at the Bronze/ Progressive Silver/ Direct Silver (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.



Orienteering

- I. Understand the information on an orienteering map (ratio, colour, conventional signs, contour) and be prepared to answer questions from the Assessor.
- II. Use a log book to show the following and explain to the Assessor:
 - 1. The history of orienteering
 - 2. Types of orienteering
 - 3. Equipment for doing orienteering
 - 4. Safety precautions for taking part in orienteering
 - 5. Rules and regulations of doing orienteering
- III. Demonstrate the following skills to the Assessor: 3S, thumb method, handrail method and collecting features.

Note

Holders of Orienteering Level 1 Certificate issued by the Hong Kong Orienteering Association are qualified for this badge.

Remarks

An appointed Guider who holds a valid Orienteering Coach Certificate may take this badge assessment for her own Unit.

- Holders of this badge who participate in activities for a minimum of 3 months
 OR complete recognized training for a minimum of 13 hours, are qualified for
 the Physical Recreation Section at the Bronze (Minors) Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Physical Recreation Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Orienteering" topic are qualified for this badge.



Outdoor Cooking

- I. Cook a meal for 2 people out of doors which includes:
 - 1. Two dishes and a soup or a hot drink.
 - 2. Using two different kinds of cooking methods.
 - 3. A balanced menu.
 - 4. Submitting your plan (including the menu, recipe, quantity and cost) for approval to the Unit Guider and show it to the Assessor in the assessment.
- II. Explain to the Assessor how you select, store and prepare the food beforehand.
- III. Demonstrate the following:
 - 1. How to keep the cooked food warm.
 - 2. Wash the utensils, remove the rubbish and clean the area after the meal.
- IV. Prepare a standard first aid kid and explain the treatment of burns and scalds.
- V. Use camping stove in the assessment and explain to the Assessor the safety precautions to be taken and demonstrate how to change gas or add fuel.

Note

You may take a Guide friend with you to help you. If your friend wishes to be assessed for this badge at the same time, the two of you must share the preparation and work for the assessment and be able to satisfy the Assessor that your efforts were equal.

Remarks

- 1. An appointed Guider who holds a valid HKAYP Expedition Instructor Certificate may take this badge assessment for her own Unit.
- 2. An appointed Guider who holds a valid Camper's License or a Quartermaster Certificate may take this badge assessment for her own Unit.
- 3. The Current Division Camp Consultant may take this badge assessment for Guides from her Division.

Physical Fitness (Stage I)

Participate in the following events for at least three months.

- 3. Sitting on the floor, stretch the upper limbs forward and measure the scale.
- 4. Participate in a sport which is played by hand.
- 5. Practice jogging until you attain the target of 1280 meters (16 Rounds) within nine minutes.

 - 2. Practice sit-up and record how many times you can do in one minute.
 - 3. Sitting on the floor, stretch the upper limbs forward and measure the reach.
 - 4. Participate in a sport which is played by hand.
 - 5. Practice jogging until you attain the target of 1476 meters (18 ½ rounds) within nine minutes.

Pioneering

- I. Demonstrate how to use and carry an axe and a saw; and know how to maintain them.
- II. Make and use two of the following:
 - 1. An emergency shelter
 - 2. A ladder
 - 3. A means of crossing a stream
- III. Follow a map through an area unfamiliar to you and make three discoveries to be indicated by the Assessor.
- IV. Use natural material to boil a cup of water in twenty minutes.
- V. Cook something without using utensils.
- VI. List the Tracking Signs, and explain how to use them and the aims of using them.



Sports

Before starting to work for this badge you must either have taken part for at least three months in a sport in which you act as an individual; or have played regularly for three months as a member of a team in any team sport. Keep a record of events you take part in and show it to the Assessor.

- I. When you start to work for the badge, seek advice from your coach, teacher or a qualified instructor, set yourself targets for improvement over at least the next six weeks.
- II. a. Explain the rules of the sport and the safety rules applicable to it.
 - b. Describe what clothing and equipment is needed and the care of it.
- III. Demonstrate to the Assessor the warming-up activities appropriate to your chosen sport or discuss with him or her preparations for playing it.
- IV. Demonstrate to the Assessor, or take proof of, the progress you have made in your chosen sport. Discuss this with him or her and set yourself targets for the future.
- V. Explain to the Assessor how you get to know more about your chosen sport by watching a television series on it, studying a sports personality or reading a book about it and tell the Assessor what you have learnt.

Note

- 1. Holders of "Pre-Alpha" Level Certificate or above in Ice Skating are eligible for this badge.
- 2. The following items cannot be used for this badge: Cycling, Swimming and Canoeing.

- Holders of this badge are qualified for the Physical Recreation Section at the Bronze Level of the HKAYP.
- Candidates who have completed the Physical Recreation Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Sports" topic are qualified for this badge. (Excluding cycling, swimming and canoeing)



Star Gazing

- I. Keep a logbook with photos over a period of six months or above at approximately the same time in the evening giving observations of stars, moon and planets (if any) visible from a window, garden or a designated place. There should be at least five entries of the shapes and positions of the moon or stars (including direction and height. It is suggested that the photo should include buildings or landscapes so as to show its height from the land.) You should also record the time and the weather. (e.g. clear sky, cloudy, etc.)
- II. Recognize the shape and location for eight of the following:
 - 1. The Big Dipper, the "W" of Cassiopeia and point out the location of the Polaris
 - 2. The big triangle in Spring (Spica, Denebola, Arcturus)
 - 3. The Leo
 - 4. The Scorpio
 - 5. The Centaurs
 - 6. The Gemini
 - 7. The Taurus
 - 8. The approximate location of the centre of the Milky Way
 - 9. The Polari
 - 10. The big curve of the Spring (the curve formed by the Saptarishi, Arcturus and Spica)
 - 11. The big triangle of Summer (Altair, Lyra and Cygnus)
 - 12. The big square of Autumn (the four stars at the belly of the Pegasus)
 - 13. The big triangle of Winter (Orion, Sirius, Procyon)
- III. Understand the following on star gazing:
 - 1. The attitude of star gazing and the suitable conditions for star gazing such as season, date and weather.
 - 2. The types of astronomical phenomena in the atmospheric layer.
 - 3. The difference of astronomical phenomena in different parts of the world.
 - 4. The relationship between seasons and the starry sky.
 - 5. The number of planets and their names.
 - 6. The number of constellations.
 - 7. Different shapes of the moon.
 - 8. Constellations in any two seasons in the four. You must list at least one in each season.



Star Gazing

- IV. Know how to use simulated star softwares and use them to find out information of astronomical phenomena.
- V. Know how to use a rotate star chart.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Star Gazing" topic are qualified for this badge.



Swimming (Stage I)

- I. Swim 50 metres in any style.
- II. Float on the water for 30 seconds.
- III. Tread water for 1 minute.
- IV. Dive and swim 5 metres. (The whole body should be below water surface.)
- V. Explain swimming safety rules.
- VI. Illustrate how to use the basic swimming-aid apparatus, e.g. buoy, lilo, a life jacket, etc.

Note

Holders of certification letter (with letter head or official chop) from official swimming organizations are eligible for this badge.

Remarks

An appointed Guider who holds a valid Life Saving certificate may take this badge assessment for her own Unit.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Holders of this badge are qualified for the Physical Recreation Section at the Bronze Level of the HKAYP.



Swimming (Stage II)

Must be a holder of Swimming Badge (Stage I)

- I. Swim 50 metres in free style.
- II. Swim 50 metres in breast stroke.
- III. Swim 50 metres in back stroke and life-saving stroke.
- IV. From the surface of the water, dive to the bottom at a depth of 2 metres (or the nearest depth available but not less than 1.5 metres) find an object 2-4kg and bring it to land. If you fail at your first attempt, the test must be repeated three times and be successfully completed on each occasion.
- V. Dive into the pool and plunge 10 metres in 1 minute or under. (A plunge is a standing dive made head first from a firm take off i.e. side of pool. The body must be kept motionless, face downward and no progressive action shall be imparted to it other than the impetus of the dive.)

Note

Holders of certification letter (with letter head or official chop) from official swimming organizations are eligible for this badge.

Remarks

An appointed Guider who holds a valid Life Saving certificate may take this badge assessment for her own Unit.

Hong Kong Award for Young People

Holders of this badge are qualified for the Physical Recreation Section at the Silver Level of the HKAYP.



Weather Knowledge

- I. Keep a daily record of the following for at least a month:
 - 1. Wind force and direction (Beaufort Scale)
 - 2. Amount of rainfall
 - 3. Temperature
 - 4. Relative humidity
 - 5. Barometer reading
 - 6. Weather warning signals
- II. Describe six signs foretelling the weather, and show records of testing their accuracy from your own observation.
- III. Identify three cloud types and briefly explain how they are formed.
- IV. Explain the characteristics of the wind directions of Hong Kong in summer and winter.
- V. Choose two of the following and explain how they are formed: dew; fog; hail; snow and rainbow.
- VI. Make either a simple rain gauge or a wind vane. Know how to use it to obtain reasonably reliable records.
- VII. Choose five of the Solar terms out of the 24 and explain their characteristics and indications.

VIII.

- 1. Explain how a storm is formed.
- 2. Introduce the characteristics of seasonal storm in Hong Kong.
- 1. Introduce the categories and grading of storms (Tropical Cyclones) in Hong Kong.

Candidates who have completed the Skills Section at the Bronze Level or above of the HKAYP in the "Weather Knowledge" topic are qualified for this badge.
